




Halogen & stock bulbs

Tech Session occurred with the usual bit of banter along with smiles to brighten everyone's day. Clearing the lift for this event was unnecessary because all work was done in the driveway. First to set a dash panel aglow was Judy's blue cat. The car was selected in the hopes that the dual gauge cluster would be easier and faster to install than my single pod unit. Judy's car had the seat removed for access while my cage made it senseless to do so. Removing the three screws and exercising special care to remove the bulbs then inserting the LED ones was easily accomplished for both consoles. It's important to spread the ground blade carefully to insure good contact so that it slides between the housing tightly. Additionally, be sure to follow the instructions regarding the holder clamps to make certain that the LEDs do not fall within the gauge itself. Should the LED drop, you must then dismantle the gauge itself to get it out.

Al worked hours on both cars. Both John and Tom guided him. Each had performed this task individually and had much to share. Tom made further modifications to his tach and speedo to place two extra lights in each using directions from Johnny Woods. Tom reports that lighting is no longer a problem in his car. I wonder if he has to wear sunglasses while driving at night because of all the lumens within. I found the green light selection works well but somewhat less bright than I expected. The white LEDs, I imagine, work a bit better. Alternative to the LEDs we used here is a halogen bulb I found in my spare speedo gauge. It uses the same blade type connector as the stock ones. My recollection is that it is sourced from an 80s BMW. Perhaps the Woods modification that he'd made for a Mangusta is the way to go. That modification is a bit troublesome without the right instructions (see Tom for details).
